Application Procedure	Students should complete our online application		
	<ul> <li>Once completed, the form should be printed out and signed by the Study Abroad/Exchange representative from the home university.</li> </ul>		
	• This should then by sent <b>along</b> with the student's supporting documents.		
	<ul> <li>The application takes around 4-6 weeks to process, after which an acceptance letter will be sent to the home university.</li> </ul>

Required	<ul> <li>A copy of any English language certificates indicated by the student on the online application form</li> </ul>		
Language Requirements	If the student is a non-native speaker of English the minimum TOEFL score of 220 or IELTS 6.0 is required if entering in the September or January semesters.

INSURANCE INFORMATION			
Health Insurance	Leeds has no compulsory health insurance policy. Private insurance is, however, recommended if students will be studying for less than 6 months.		
NHS	The NHS is publicly funded and includes services provided by family doctors (general practitioners); specialists; hospitals; dentists; the ambulance service and opticians. Some NHS services are free to everyone, some are subsidised and there are some services for which you will have to pay the full cost.		
	If you are going to do a course which lasts more than six months, the treatment for you under the NHS will be free or will be subsidised.		
	If you are in the UK to do a course which lasts less than six months you need to obtain medical insurance for yourself unless your home country has a reciprocal health agreeme with the UK. We recommend this is done before coming to the UK. The Welfare Services Office has a list of these countries. If you have not done so you should contact a insurance broker - you will find a list in the Yellow Pages Telephone Directory, after arrive
